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Rosie says: "I work as the <u>marketing coordinator</u>." Rosie therefore works for the charity Oxfam as the marketing coordinator.

Rosie says: "The Oxfam Walk is entirely run by <u>volunteers</u>. We do have help from Oxfam headquarters, but the planning, the marketing and all the people that help on the day all are <u>unpaid volunteers</u>." The event is therefore largely organised by volunteers.
