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The text says: "He was left with a sense that he was less important as a foster carer than his wife, despite the fact that they fostered as a couple. Joe was not alone in feeling that way." Joe therefore shared his fostering responsibilities with his wife.

The text says: "Male foster carers frequently report being overlooked in discussions and decision-making about a child in favour of their female partners." Male foster parents therefore felt overlooked.

The text says: "Research by NCH shows that men are failing to come forward to work with children because they are frightened of being labelled paedophiles." Men are therefore scared of being labelled a paedophile if they take jobs involving kids.

3

The text says: "In a society where men are often perceived as more likely to do harm than good to children, their ability to nurture is still called into question." Men are therefore perceived as being incapable of nurturing.

The text says: "Attitudes towards men and childcare are changing in the home, as more and more fathers vote with their feet and decide to stay at home to play a part in the daily care of their own children." Therefore the development of men staying at home to take care of the children can be observed in families.

The text says: "He also feels more supported since the creation of a local networking group for men in fostering." Joe therefore gets encouragement and positive feedback from a male local networking group.
